## HOMEWORK POLICY

This policy sets the appropriate year level homework expectations required to consolidate student learning and provide opportunities for exploring new ideas at Freshwater Bay Primary School.

## Underlying Principles

Freshwater Bay Primary School's homework policy considers the needs of the students and the phase of their development. Homework is defined as a set of targeted tasks to extend skills and concepts from classroom teaching and learning that a student is expected to complete at home.

Homework should:

- Support the development of the student's independence as a learner.
- Form part of a developmental learning program that is responsive to individual needs, clearly relevant, supported by classroom practice and, where appropriate, developed in collaboration with students.
- Be phased in gradually and consistently as students move through the upper primary years.
- Further the partnership between school and home.
- Avoid dependence on unreasonable levels of parental assistance or resources that are not readily available to the student.
- Be set without impinging on reasonable time for family, recreational, cultural and social pursuits relevant to the student's age, development and educational aspirations.
- Be disassociated from any form of punishing students or means of discipline.


## Roles and Responsibilities

The teachers will:

- Clearly communicate homework expectations to students and parents.
- Ensure any set homework is part of a developmental program consistent with the students' needs and provides consolidation of the current classroom programme.
- Support development of students' independence as learners and encourage students to take responsibility for their own learning.
- Provide guidelines on the approximate time students should spend on homework.
- Enhance development of students' study habits to promote self-discipline and time management skills.
- Endeavour to check completed homework and provide feedback to students on their work.

Guidelines

| KINDERGARTEN | No formal homework set. <br> News telling tasks (may require parent support). |
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| PRE-PRIMARY | Home reading and high frequency words introduced. <br> Parents are encouraged to read to their children daily, <br> count things whenever an interesting opportunity <br> allows and to take an interest in things children bring <br> home from school. |
| JUNIOR PRIMARY (YEARS 1-2) | Limited to 10-15 minutes per day to complete short <br> tasks relating to initial sounds, phonics, word <br> recognition, spelling and basic maths. <br> The aim is to establish positive routines and <br> opportunities for parents and children to enjoy learning <br> together. <br> Home reading for pleasure is extremely important, <br> whether child reading to parent, or parent reading to <br> child. |
| MIDDLE PRIMARY (YEARS 3-4) | Limited to 15-30 minutes per day to reinforce material <br> covered in class, and practice number facts, times <br> tables or spelling lists. Introduction to research and <br> problem solving tasks through use of online and written <br> resources to encourage investigative thought and <br> writing. <br> Home reading for pleasure is extremely important. |
| UPPER PRIMARY (YEARS 5 \& 6) | Approximately 30 minutes per day to reinforce material <br> covered in class or investigatory and research tasks for <br> extension. Homework should incorporate short and <br> longer term tasks that develop time management skills. <br> Home reading for pleasure is extremely important. |
